Waste Licensing – Introduction



 July 2009 the NEM:WA came into operation – provisions regarding licensing of waste management activities (Chapter 5)



- Minister published a list of activities which require a waste licence (3 July 2009)
- GN No. R. 718 defines list of activities based on thresholds:
 - Category A Requires a Basic Assessment Process
 - Category B Requires a Scoping/EIA Process

(in accordance with the NEMA EIA Regulations of 2010)

Note - Additional requirements in terms of the NEM:WA must also be met (e.g. placement of an advert in 2 local newspapers in the area).

Do you need a waste licence?



- Depends on the types and quantity of wastes which you are handling and the activity/ies being carried out on the site.
- Activities include treatment, re-use, recovery, recycling, storage, grinding, shredding, baling, sorting, and disposal of waste within thresholds.
- Licence is also required for upgrades/expansions, if you plan to alter your facility, as well as decommission your facility.

Waste Licensing - Process

CITY OF CAPE TOWN ISINEKO SASEKAPA STAD KAAPSTAD
THIS CITY WORKS FOR YOU



- Competent Authority (CA):
 - Provincial (general waste)
 - National (hazardous waste)
- An application must be made to the CA. Once a reference number has been received the process (either Basic Assessment or Scoping/EIA) shall be followed.
- Waste licensing has a compulsory element of public participation (in line with the NEMA EIA Regulations, 2010).

Waste Licensing - Timeframes

- BA Process 8/10 months
- Scoping/EIA 12 months or more

Timeframes dependant on school holidays, public holidays, level of public sensitivity etc.

Challenges

An EAPs perspective...

- Legislative requirements Laws have been changing and requirements for waste licensing – has created delays and budgetary implications
- Definitions as provided in the Regulations are broad and unclear – Waste licenses are required for establishment and alterations of facilities – includes even minor changes.
- Decision making timeframes Are not adhered to - delays in process
- Competent Authority Certain cases authorisation required in terms of NEMA and NEM:WA. Different competent authorities - more administration.
